Yardage required for bodice and skirt linings:

Yardage required for sash and rosette is always one yard. See pattern instructions for details.

Fabric suggestions:

Georgette or chiffon for outer layers; cotton, rayon, or acetate for lining; georgette, silk, or stretch velvet for sash and rosette.

Notions:

Thread, 18-inch invisible zipper (or buttons: see pattern instructions).

Notes:

If you wish to make multi-colored skirt layers, you will need to divide the yardage amount by the number of skirt layers (3) and purchase the correct amount for each layer. For instance, your topmost overskirt and bottom skirt layer could be one color, and your center overskirt could be another.

You can also add more skirt layers if you wish, although the waistline seam gets bulkier with each addition.

** You will only need to add length to the skirt yardage requirement if you are over 5' 8" tall.

If you wish to add the optional lace overlay to the bodice inset, you will need 1/4 yard of 45"-wide lace material.

The pattern piece for the size 18-26 bodice overlaps the skirt back piece. I'd recommend that you trace this pattern piece onto interfacing or pattern paper. Tracing the entire pattern onto interfacing is a good idea anyway, since it makes the pieces sturdier and easier to use.
